
Excavation report of the outbuilding at Plas Tirion.

PTSA.

Due to health and safety reasons a risk assessment was carried out and it was decided that the contamination (animal droppings) had to be removed before we started the excavations. When all this had been done we still decided to ware coveralls, masks and gloves to do the work due to the dry dusty conditions inside the building. (Fig 9.)



The walls are crudely built of country rock, with not much in the way of foundations. This may have been the reason for the collapse of the western gable end, (Fig 1.) which was rebuilt further west than the original wall, sometime during the second half of the nineteenth century. The dating evidence on the sill shows that it was sawn by a Greaves circular saw. (Fig 2.)

Excavations started on the floor of PTSA, and after the first spit was removed we came across eighteenth century brick work 25.4cm (10") x 11.4cm ($4\frac{1}{2}$ ") x 6cm ($2\frac{3}{8}$ "), with a stone slab floor, this turned out to be an eighteenth century corn drying kiln (*Fig 3. Drg: 6.*).

These corn drying kilns have changed very little since the Roman times. They have a flue channel where the air from a small fired stokehole at one end is heated, and fed through a flue to where it rises up under a parching floor where the corn is dried. (Fig 6. Drg: 7.) Sacking from the parching floor on the top of the kiln has been found stuffed into holes in the internal east wall, the reason for this is not obvious (Fig 7.). A sample of this sacking has been left with the tenant for analysis. To the west of the kiln there is a clay floor (Fig 4. Fig 8.) which was probably used as a threshing floor; where the corn or other grain was threshed with a flail, after the corn was separated it was then placed on the sacking on top of the kiln to parch. Smoke marks have been left on the inside of the drying area of the kiln, and are still evident today. (Fig 5.) PTSA floor is about 0.5m lower than PTSB with no partition wall between, only a 0.5m platform. On this platform the eastern wall of the kiln was built using 18th century bricks. This shows up well on the smoke marked eastern wall.

The suggestion is that there was a doorway at the south corner of the original western gable end wall (*Drg 12.*) One of the reasons for making this assumption is that an east west drain runs from the central east wall and as most drains then went under the threshold, this allowed easy access to maintain the drain. It then joined an open ditch on the outside of the original building. With the collapse of this gable end wall and a new gable end being built further west, this drain was probably forgotten, causing it to block and water to become a problem., and to alleviate this a drain was dug under the south wall and filled with edge on slates (similar to a French drain), (*Fig 11.*), and was capped with slate slabs and moss slates. (*Fig 10.*)

The dendrochronology earliest dating of the beams in PTSA is 1498, this date is when the timber was felled, but not the date they were installed in the present position, most of these timbers have been re-used in this outbuilding probably from the old Plas Tirion before the new Plas Tirion house was built c 1565. Another reason to think that they have been re-used is that the slots and holes in the beams have no apparent relevance to the location that they are in. The grog loft or platform had a 10cm layer of ash lime floor (Fig 13.) laid on battens and planks (Fig 12.). The two westernmost beams must have been built in after the new gable end wall had been erected; implying that the lime ash floor grog loft must have come later. The second beam from the west had no blackening and was of rounded wood, again suggesting a later build. Probably this beam was erected after the kiln had become obsolete.

Slate roofs.

The original roof was made of random moss slates also known as diminishing courses, peggies or *cerrig mwsog*. They would have been laid on a bed of sphagnum moss, because of the uneven surface of the slates. This would allow the slates to bed down better and stop the wind from dislodging them. The moss was renewed as required by a *mwsoglwr*, moss man, a man who replaced the moss under the slates on the roof. On the back of a moss slate there is a slaters mark (*Fig 14*.) just below the peg hole and to the right of it. These marks are easier to see on the Ordovician slate because of the composition of the rock, their hardness is between the Cambrian and the Silurian, the Cambrian is too hard and only leaves a surface scratch and the Silurian is so soft that it gets warn away.

In the second half of the nineteenth century the western gable end was rebuilt and roofed with Ordovician 'broad ladies', 16" x 9" slates. Then in the 1970's a roof of Cambrian slates, countesses, 20 x 10 was laid. (Fig 15.)



Excavations on the outside western gable end wall unearthed a large boulder. On the surface of the boulder was prominent scratch marks, which were thought to be glacial marks, but on further investigation these were found to be plough marks. There are about 135 (Fig 17.) of these marks on the boulder, orientating north west to south east. Assuming the plough was pulled by two oxen, it was done prior to the building being erected, because of the proximity of the boulder to the building. (Fig 16. Drg 12.). Our estimation for the construction of the building is c 1700, if the plough marks were made once a year this would have taken us back to 1565 (1700 – 135 = 1565). This date coincided with the building of the existing Plas Tirion, probably this building (Plas Tirion) post-dated an earlier building at Plastirion c1498 (Dunn pers comm.)

This boulder may also have been the reason why the new western gable end was built at this acute angle (*Drg 12.*).

The assumption that a house was there prior to the 1565 Plas Tirion may well be true, but not necessarily on the location of the outbuildings. All the archaeological evidence suggests a much later date for this building.

PTSB.

Excavations were started on the fireplace or a fire range as it was found out to be.

The bricks used in the fireplace were 21.5cm $(8\frac{1}{2})$ x 10.2cm (4) x 6.5cm $(2\frac{1}{2})$. A shadow of the range can be seen in the back wall (*Fig 19.*).

One shard of transfer printed ware dated c1860 was found *in situ* cemented under the brick work. (Fig 20, Fig 21.). This suggests that the fire range was inserted after this date.

The dividing wall (chimney breast) between PTSA and PTSB has not been married into the north/south walls, only butted against them, again suggesting a later building date. The eastern wall of PTSB may have been built at this time also, because it was built on top of an earlier slab floor, and was in fact an internal wall, before the eastern part of the building was demolished to give better access to Plas Tirion.

The blocked off doorway which was converted into a window in the northern wall has traces of plaster on the eastern wall (Fig 22. Fig 23.).

There appears to have been three floors, two cemented ones and one stone slab floor, which had been repaired near the north doorway with an ornate crazy paving type floor. (Fig 26.) Two sondages were excavated into the floor of PTSB down to the natural; (Fig 24, Fig 25.) no other floor or dating evidence was found to suggest an earlier building.

There was an old doorway in the southern wall which had been partially blocked up and a window installed. The new doorway was of a later build. (Fig 27.).

When excavating the grog-loft in PTSA (Cat, No PTSA 042, PTSA 043) small fragments of glass were found, fourteen had the mark of the cames where the angle of the cut glass was rubbing against the lead support. There were two thickness of glass one was 1.59mm and the other was 2.59mm. It was also convenient to cut diamond-shaped panes from a single "crown" of glass with less waste than that caused by cutting square panes. Square panes are most often found in the grander or later buildings, and sometimes only on ground floor windows.

Also a 130mm length of cames was found as well. There were two angles found on the glass one was 80° and the other was 100°. This would have given a diamond shaped lozenge.

William and Mary copper half penny coin dated 1694, this has worn badly, suggesting it was lost during the first half of the 18th century.

PLAS TIRON POTTERY REPORT.

The fabric is an orange colour, the base is very clean underneath, this would imply that it was for table ware only, and not for cooking. Slip trailing was done with the aid of a cow horn or quill, and this soon became the standard practice. This shard is a moulded slipware, three shades of slip have been used, and the main colour is a yellow slip, with brown trailed leaf like shapes, infilled with olive green slip, and (jewelled) decoration in white slip along the edges of the leaves, these are white dots. Dated to the early 18th century.

The fabric is a red colour, thrown, the outside of this vessel is sooted, and this must have been used on a fire for heating food. These two shards come from the same vessel; the main slip is yellow, with a brown trailed slip decoration. Dated to the mid 18th century.

Fig 31/32. SLIPWARE. Cat, No PTSA 013-013.

The fabric is a light colour; on the inside it has a yellow glaze, the outside main colour is a dark brown glaze, with slip decoration in yellow. This shard is a body of a cup, and the style suggests a date of the early 18th century.

Fig 33. MIDLANDS PURPLE WARE TYPE. Cat, No PTSA 002.

The fabric is grey, but has red slip inside unglazed. It is a thrown pot, glazed in black externally, it has an embossed circular decoration on one shard. This is possibly a Midlands purple ware type, it would have been a heavy pot or pitcher.

Fig 34. BLACK WARE. Cat, No PTSA 014.

The fabric is red, it is black ware, glazed both sides, rim is worn slightly, but the style looks like a rim of a cup. Dated 18th century.

Fig 35. BLACK WARE. Cat, No PTSA 025.

Black ware, thrown pot, glazed both sides, it was found in the kiln, and on inspection the glaze has (bubbled) blistered due to the extreme heat. Other black ware shards were found in the kiln, but had not been burnt.

Fig 36. MOTTLED WARE. Cat, No PTSA 023.

Mottled ware, light coloured fabric, glazed both sides, thrown pot. Dated early 18th century.

Mottled ware, red fabric, dark brown glazed both sides, thrown pot. Eight pieces found, seven pieces join together. Dated 18th century.



OUTSIDE THE BUILDINGS.

PTSAOW produced the highest amount of pottery. Also fragments of glass, a piece of plough, dinky toys, one silver plated dessert spoon, (Walker & Hill), this spoon was engraved with Riverside Tea Garden Bettws y Coed, and ORUBA, this possibly dates to when a ship of that name, was built in Barrow and sailed to Australia in 1893. In this area there was an assemblage of 11 different types of pottery, and total of (101) shards. The pottery found here was 19th and 20th century.

PTSBOE, this area had the smallest amount of pottery; water had damaged the glaze on some of the shards. This area is by the road that goes to the Plas, and is part of the building that was demolished at some date to make the road wider. In this area there was an assemblage of 5 different types of pottery, and total of (34) shards. These again are dated 19th and 20th century.

PTSBOS, outside the now south doorway. Glass bottles, and fragments, and moss slates were found in the pig's trough. Only a small assemblage of 2 types of pottery, and a total of (4) shards, and again dated 19th and 20th century.

POTTERY CONCLUSION.


On the evidence of the pottery found in PTSA, the earliest date we can give is 18th century, and most of these were found near the kiln area. In this building there was an assemblage of 14 different types of pottery, and a total of (78) shards, and only 3 pieces of clay pipe stems, and 1 broken clay pipe bowl, one coin was found, a William and Mary half penny dated between 1689-94, and this was found in front of the kiln. The dates of the pottery indicate that the building was not used as a dwelling to live in, but more of an outbuilding.

On the evidence of the pottery found in PTSB, only three pieces of pottery were dated 18th century, one shard was found by the new south doorway, which may have been disturbed when the south doorway was rebuilt, the other two shards were found in the fireplace at the lower level. One piece which dated the fire range was c1860, a transfer printed ware in situ cemented under the brick work. The rest of the pottery was dated 19th century. In this building there was an assemblage of 8 different types of pottery, and total of (52) shards. This part of the building again does not indicate it was used at an earlier date than the 18th century.


ARCHAEOLOGICAL CONCLUSION.

The conclusion is that Plas Tirion outbuilding was never a dwelling house, only used for farm activities. The 1498 dated timber was re-used, maybe from an earlier house than Plas Tirion itself. The evidence for this has come from the archaeology, which has found no evidence earlier than c1700 for the existence of the outbuildings.


